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Hazardous Wastes Don't Belong in the Recycling Cart

Keep it Clean When Recycling

Items such as pool chemicals, drain cleaners, batteries, pesticides or medical waste, including needles and "sharps," are NOT acceptable in your recycling cart. These materials are dangerous to workers sorting the recyclables. Please collect needles and sharps in a well-sealed, puncture-proof plastic or metal container and place in your garbage cart. Chemicals and other household hazardous wastes must be taken to the Household Hazardous Waste Collection Facility in Martinez. Call 1-800-646-1431 for more information.

New Collection Rates Effective March 1st

Beginning this billing cycle, most CCCSWA service area residents will see a modest increase in their bills for solid waste services, which include recycling, yard waste and garbage collection, as well as two Reuse & Cleanup Days per year.

The county and each city determines if a rate adjustment is necessary in its area by evaluating factors such as increased fuel and local service costs.

Although you may be paying more, you're also getting more. Since the last rate increase, the CCCSWA has implemented single-stream recycling and expanded the Reuse & Cleanup Days program to include electronics and a winter pickup.

However, you can lower your rate by reducing your garbage cart size or by becoming a CCCSWA-certified home composter.

The Waste-Cutting Edge

How Practicing the 3 R's Helps Slow Global Warming

Recycling Is Cool. Really Cool.

Some benefits of reducing, reusing, and recycling are obvious. For example, less material to the landfill means less land sacrificed to bury our garbage. But cutting down on waste also reduces greenhouse gases—the stuff that warms our atmosphere, makes glaciers melt, and contributes to extreme weather conditions.

How so? Take soda cans: to produce aluminum, bauxite ore has to be extracted from the Earth, transported and processed. This requires large amounts of energy—the equivalent of some 1,740 gallons of gasoline for every ton of aluminum.

When gasoline or other fossil fuels are burned, carbon dioxide—the most common greenhouse gas—is released into the atmosphere. In contrast, making one ton of aluminum from recycled material uses only the equivalent of about 90 gallons of gasoline—an obvious score for the climate.



Making new products out of recycled materials uses a fraction of the energy needed to make them from virgin sources. This savings in energy use helps slow down global warming.

Landfills actually generate greenhouse gases.

But wait, there's more! Landfills themselves actually generate greenhouse gases. When organic materials, such as paper and food scraps, break down in landfills over time, they emit methane, a gas with 23 times the global warming potential of carbon dioxide. Luckily, there is a simple remedy: recycling paper and composting organic materials!

Speaking of paper recycling, the more recycled paper we all purchase, the fewer trees need to be cut down. Instead, these same trees continue to absorb carbon dioxide from the atmosphere and turn it into oxygen, another climate cooling process.

Of course, making new goods from recycled materials still requires some energy and creates some greenhouse gases. That's why reducing and reusing are truly the coolest of the 3 R's.

Food Scrap Recycling Pilot Coming

By 2007, Central Contra Costa residents could be sending leftovers and kitchen scraps to a composting facility rather than the landfill—that is, if a trial program in Danville this March goes well.



In February, Danville residents will receive a convenient kitchen container to collect food scraps and food-soiled paper. Residents simply empty the scraps from the container into their yard waste carts for their regularly scheduled pick-up. Detailed instructions will be distributed with the pails.

will be composted. While the concept is the same as the composting you do in your backyard—organic materials breaking down into fertile soil—it will happen on a much larger scale. This will enable you to compost bones, shells, dairy products, food-soiled paper and other items that are not recommended for backyard composting.

In the next issue of Diversions, we will explain in more detail how exactly these large-scale composting operations work and what happens with the finished product.

Residents Trade In Mercury for Safer Alternative Thermometer Exchange Fever Grips Rossmoor

The mercury was rising, quite literally, at a thermometer collection event in Rossmoor on November 16. Central Contra Costa Sanitary District counted 541 residents who turned out to trade in their old mercury thermometers for safe digital ones. Rossmoorians dropped off other items containing mercury, too. "I used to play with this stuff when I was a kid," said one resident as he handed over a full jar of the silvery liquid.

Of course, we now know that mercury is toxic and accumulates in the body, causing a wide range of health problems. To safely dispose of mercury-containing household items such as thermometers, barometers and certain thermostats, contact the Central Contra Costa Household Hazardous Waste Collection Facility at 1-800-646-1431.
